Literacy is the Language of Liberty



Last month's newsletter highlighted historic preservation as one of the three pillars that DAR is founded on. This month with students returning to school, I feel it is appropriate to present education as the next pillar of DAR. Some of the ways the National Society promotes education is through DAR schools, Community Classroom, grants to local teachers and Literacy Promotion.

Most understand literacy to mean the ability to read and write, it also includes the ability to comprehend information, and express yourself verbally or through the written word. In addition, basic mathematics and being able to understand signs and symbols of your culture are relevant when it comes to literacy. Even today, people are still oppressed, exploited and remain in poverty due to illiteracy.

As of June 2024, Nevada has the sixth lowest literacy rate in the United States, with 74.7% of its adult population having basic or below basic literacy skills. This means that Nevada ranks 45th out of 50 states in the country for adult literacy. Additionally, only 44% of elementary school kids in Nevada are reading at grade level, and that number drops to 41% in Clark County.

The Virgin Valley DAR is working on forming a Literacy Promotion Committee in an effort to improve the literacy statistics in Mesquite, Clark County and Nevada.

Literacy specifically increases job opportunities and access to further educational opportunities. Literacy means freedom.

Agent 355

If you are a fan of spy stories and happen to be on Long Island, you could visit the regional center of spy activity during the American Revolution. Setauket, New York was an agricultural community founded in 1655 and home to several of America's first spy ring.



In August 1776, after the battle of Long Island, a.k.a. the battle of Brooklyn, the Continental Army lost control of lower New York. Now occupying Manhattan and Long Island the British troops held a military advantage as Manhattan became a key naval base for England.

In December 1776 Nathan Hale was captured and hanged as a rebel spy. Although there is no official record, he is remembered for saying, "I only regret that I have but one life to give for my country". Being a spy has always been a dangerous profession and in the late 1700s it was no exception. What was different about early espionage was that it was singular, meaning that basically a lone person would gather and deliver information from point A to point B. The death of Nathan Hale is where this story begins.

After losing control of Manhattan and Long Island, General Washington was in desperate need of British intel. In 1778 Major Benjamin Talmage, a former Yale classmate of Nathan Hale, was named chief of intelligence by General Washington. Talmage was from the small community of Setauket on the north shore of Long Island, where he recruited his childhood friends Abraham Woodhull, Caleb Brewster and Austin Rowe to form America's first spy Ring. Other members of this secret network included Mrs. Anna Strong, a local patriot whose husband was captured and being held by the British, and a New York City businessman named Robert Townsend.

Woodhull a farmer had a sister that lived in Manhattan and was able to maneuver into and around the city of New York without causing suspicion from British troops. There he would gather information from Townsend, return to Setauket and would leave the information at drop points in coves along the Long Island Sound. Brewster, a whaler, would retrieve the intel and sail across the sound to Connecticut, where the information was delivered to Talmage and then on to George Washington. Legend has it, that once there was a message from Woodhull, Anna Strong would hang a black petticoat on a clothesline and then hang 1-6 handkerchiefs to signal to Brewster as to which cove he would find the message.

Woodhall's codename was Samuel Culper, short for Culpeper which was the name of a town that a young George Washington surveyed in his youth. When Townsend was brought into the group, he was given the alias Culper Jr. The Culper spy ring had a book of approximately 763 numbers, all of which represented relevant words. Many of these numbers represented people and places. For example, 711 was code for Washington, while 721 was code for Talmage. Agent 355 is believed to mean "lady", and even today, historians do not agree upon who she was. Some speculate it was Anna Strong while others believe it was a female slave working in a house of a British Officer. In addition to coding words, the spy network also used advanced chemistry to develop invisible ink that could only be seen by applying a reagent.

In 1779, the Culper spy ring was instrumental in the outing of Benedict Arnold. After marrying a loyalist and being passed over for a promotion, Arnold's intentions were to surrender Westpoint to the British and join the Redcoats. Thanks to the Culper spies, even though Arnold got away West Point was not lost. Then in 1780 the British planned to destroy the continental currency by flooding the economy with counterfeit money. This scheme was uncovered by Townsend who delivered the plans through the spy ring in time for Congress to thwart the British objectives.

This Network was so secretive that it was not even known about until the 1930s (150 years later) and now after almost 250 years, experts still have not completely put all the pieces of this puzzle together. There is no doubt that the men and women of the Culper spy ring had a tremendous influence on America winning her independence. After the war ended, a British general was quoted saying "Washington did not beat us militarily, he simply out spied us".



Louise Leigh, Patriot: Constitution Day "Every American comes with a set of guarantees by the United States Constitution," Louise Leigh

Louise Leigh was sponsored in 2005 by Martin Severance Chapter in Pasadena, CA, for the DAR's highest honor, the Medal of Honor. She was presented this medal by then-State Regent Carol Belcher at CSSDAR State Headquarters in Glendora on 18 February 2006. This story is a reminder to us all of what one woman can achieve with faith, perseverance, and a profound love of the Constitution. Louise Leigh was 6 years old when the 19th Amendment to the Constitution was ratified. Over the course of time she would attend college, marry, be widowed, work as a medical technician, and become involved in the California Republican Party. A woman of modest means but with great love for her country, she served on County Commissions, State Boards, and was a delegate to the California Republican Party's convention the year Pete Wilson was elected Governor of California. Yet, she felt her life's work was not complete. In the mid-1990s she began attending a course on the Constitution given by the National Center for Constitutional Studies. She was stunned by how little she actually knew. Concerned that the shift away from studying it in classrooms across the country would mean students would know even less than she did, she founded Constitution Day, Inc. in 1997, as a nonpartisan, non-profit organization. It had three goals:


