Air Force's Arlington Ladies Celebrate 75 Years of Service

Arlington National Cemetery is the most hallowed burial ground of our nation's fallen. A fully operational national cemetery since May 1864, Arlington conducts between 27 and 30 funeral services each weekday and between six and eight services on Saturdays — final farewells to fallen heroes and their family members. Arlington is one of the few cemeteries that offers graveside burials with military funeral honors with escort. For families, a service at Arlington is the time when the U.S. military bestows the honors befitting the service and sacrifice of their loved one.

In November 2023, a small group of dedicated ladies and one gentleman celebrated their 75th anniversary. The founding of this tradition coincided with the emergence of the U.S. Air Force as a distinct branch of the military. As General Hoyt S. Vandenberg, the second Chief of Staff of the Air Force and his wife Gladys walked in the cemetery, they observed that some of these services had only a chaplain and the honor guard in attendance.

Mrs. Vandenberg began to attend the services because she regarded these fallen Airmen as members of her family. She quickly recognized that they couldn't personally attend every Air Force interment, prompting her to call on close friends. Their mission was clear: to ensure that every Air Force member buried at Arlington received the recognition and appreciation they deserved from the highest echelons of leadership in this newly established service. This marked the inception of the very first group of Arlington Ladies, now a cherished and enduring part of a military tradition that is still in practice today. These Air Force wives officially became the Arlington Committee on November 8, 1948.
