Unbreakable: Recollections from a Navajo Code Talker

In 2016, the author and her husband were on a cross country car trip and ended up in Kayenta, Arizona, at the just right time to listen to a former Marine named Peter MacDonald, Sr., tell his story...

MacDonald, at left, was a Navajo code talker. The code talkers included Native Americans from over 30 tribes, and the Navajo -numbering over 400-- are the best known. Used almost exclusively by the Marine Corps in World War II, their encrypted code, which was never cracked by the enemy, helped the United

States win its way across the Pacific front from 1942 to 1945. Historians agree that the Navajo code talkers helped expedite the end of World War II and undoubtedly saved thousands of Americans from death in the Pacific, particularly on Iwo Jima.

Peter MacDonald is now 94, the youngest of the three remaining Navajo code talkers. His presentation began with a discussion about a civil engineer named Phillip Johnston who contacted a Marine Signal Corps officer (a major) after Pearl Harbor with an idea to use Navajos to create a code. Johnston was a 4-year old when his parents established a mission on Navajo land, and he learned to speak what he called "Trader Navajo." Navajo is a difficult language to pronounce as well as to learn. It includes unique sounds that involve different muscles, uses basic Subject-Object-Verb word order though flexible and irregular at a complex level and is based solely on sound. Johnston noted that it is nearly impossible to master complex Navajo unless you are born into it.

The major presented the idea to a colonel, who thought it was a hair-brained idea. But... time after time the Japanese were breaking the Americans' codes, and the military personnel were getting "clobbered."

The colonel finally relented and gave permission to recruit Navajos ... but with the firm orders that the Navajos were not to be told why. They would be asked if they'd like to fight for America, and if they made it through boot camp and combat training, then they would be informed of their secret mission. A sergeant went to the Navajo reservation to recruit 30 volunteers between the ages of 17 and 32 to fight for the United States. He explained they would be sent to boot camp, warning that it would be tough, and 29 volunteers signed up.

When they arrived at boot camp, 1,200 miles away in San Diego, they saw the ocean for the first time. They were even more surprised to see that they each got a bed, and learned what a pillow was. On top of that, they discovered that food would be provided to them, and three times a day. They didn't have to hunt it, clean it, or prepare their food. MacDonald commented that boot camp was like a resort to the Navajo Marine recruits.
